

The Bayview Centennial Committee has embarked on a fundraising campaign to solicit help from the community in the celebration of Bayview's 2010 Centennial. #### "Centennial Patron"

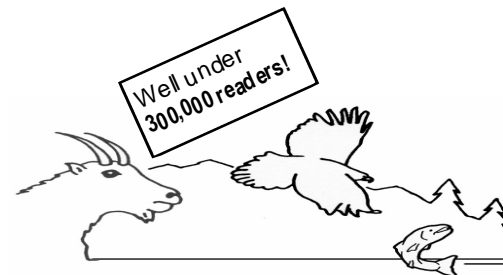

# Timberlake Fire News

**Kayak Rescue** – On July 6, we successfully rescued two kayakers from Maiden Rock after one capsized and the other made it to shore. They got caught in the passing storm which churned up over 4 foot swells in the lake. The Citizens Lake Emergency Response Group was activated and standing by if needed. We were in constant communication with Hudson Bay on Marine Channel 16 and it was a relief to hear that we had several local boaters waiting to help if needed, especially if we needed help ourselves.

**Fireworks** – We did our best over the 4<sup>th</sup> of July weekend to educate and enforce the fireworks laws. We spoke to about 30 different people/groups in Bayview using fireworks (we even chased a group of 12 out of the community center parking lot who were shooting off mortars); confiscated some illegal fireworks; extinguished four fireworks related fires (including one where we had to rappel down the hill near the rock slide) and actually had some fireworks shot off at us. The part that concerned us the most was those people using fireworks on the docks and marinas.

We received mixed feedback from community members and visitors – either

- (1) they appreciated our efforts,
- (2) we were putting a damper on people's 4<sup>th</sup> of July, or
- (3) we didn't do enough to enforce illegal fireworks.

We also faced emergency vehicle access problems that we will rectify next year with "No Parking Fire Lane" signs such as along one side of Pier Road (to Scenic Bay Marina) and Cape Horn Road. I plan to host a community meeting in May/June 2010 to get feedback on how all of you would like us to manage the fireworks and access issues for Bayview Daze 2010.

**Fire Chief Contract** – Thanks to all of the community members who spoke at the public meeting regarding my contract renewal. I truly appreciate your kind words. The contract was renewed through October 2010, but I hope to be here for years to come and I am currently looking to purchase a home in Bayview.

**Fire Code Inspections** – I am in the process of conducting fire code inspections throughout the fire district at the direction of the Fire Commissioners. We started with the schools and daycare, now we are working on the restaurants/bars and Silverwood. We will then be inspecting the other businesses. We are doing all we can to work with the owners/occupants to become compliant including the allowance of time to make corrections, usually at least 30 to 60 days depending on the hazard. Some of the main hazards we see include the following:

- Extension cords cannot be a substitute for permanent wiring,

cannot be connected in series, cannot extend through/around walls/ceilings.

- Electrical cords with splices or damage.
- Open junction boxes and open wiring splices.
- Holiday lights cannot be stapled to the structure or in place for more than 90 days.
- Propane bottles and BBQ grills must be at least 10 feet from the structure and cannot be stored underneath occupied spaces.
- Storage of combustible materials in a manner creating a fire hazard.

**Terry's Café Shut Down** – It was a difficult decision to shut down Terry's Café, not one that I take lightly, but it had to be done to prevent a large fire or serious injury. I appreciate the comments from those who supported my action and respect the opinions of those who disagreed. I'm open to discussing any Fire Code or Fire Department issue with anyone and welcome questions or concerns from the community. ## Farragut Park Boat Launch Needs a Public Bench

For as long as I can remember there has been a bench at the Farragut Park Public Boat launch until it was removed about a year ago. Granted it was old, having seen its days.

I miss the old bench. Randall Butt, Park Manager, said there would not be a replacement bench at the boat launch. He cited congestion issues and that a bench at Willow will serve the same function. I don't agree.

It is my experience that a vast majority of the time (nine months), there is no traffic or congestion issues at the Farragut boat launch. Only during the summer peak loading and unloading times are there issues. These include limited hours on certain summer weekends between late June and August. The remainder of the time, and even during the winter, visitors should not be denied a place to sit down and enjoy this spectacular view.

Mr. Butt argues that a bench at Willow is the replacement bench. It certainly is not. It is up a hill, away from the lake; and since it is not in close geographic proximity to the old bench, it cannot be considered the replacement bench.

This incredibly scenic spot is enjoyed by everyone. It is especially nice for people waiting while boats are loaded and unloaded. I say a bench actually helps by directing people, especially children, away from standing or sitting near the boat lanes.

Perhaps if more Bayview residents would take time and email both Mr. Butt and Mr. Klatt, Park and Recreation's Chair, they might be more inclined to reconsider replacing the 30-year old bench at the public boat launch. Their email addresses are: rbutt@IDPR.state.id.us skmdas@sandpoint.net

## Farragut State Park's Summer Update 2009

Recent changes to the laws governing Off Highway Vehicles (OHV's) have caused some confusion for those riding ATV's, UTV's and off road motorbikes that have the new black and white license plates. Since OHV's do not meet Federal Vehicle Safety minimums, they are not allowed to operate on State and Federal Highways. The black and white plate is valid only for local jurisdictional roads that are open to OHV use. Be sure to check with the entity that controls the road you will be riding on to make sure the road is open for OHV use.

### OHV's and Farragut State Park:

-OHV's are not legal on State Hwy 54.  
-Within Farragut State Park there is no highway easement beyond the paved road surface of State Hwy 54; any riding along the edges of Hwy 54 within Farragut State Park is considered off road travel and is prohibited.

-Since one cannot legally enter or leave Farragut State Park on an OHV, the park does not honor Day or Annual passes for Motorized Vehicle entry of an OHV. Park permits can only be issued to persons camping within the park who hauled the OHV in with them for use as an extra vehicle. That extra vehicle use has additional restrictions under park rules:

-All trails within Farragut State Park are for non-motorized use only. Any off road use, riding on trails, or short cutting where the vehicle does not use an established and open road can be expected to result in a citation for each operator involved.

-The park provides pedestrian and equestrian access points in the fence line for local residents to use for convenient access of the park trail systems. Improper use of these access

gates by motorized vehicles may result in their closure.

This fall the park will continue resource work with roadside thinning. The project will clear trees and brush from the road edge back to the ditch line to re-establish proper drainage and clearance from the road edge. During the fall of 2010, Resource Conservation Thinning Project work will begin in the area within Hwy 54, South Road, Waldron campground and Kinglet Road. The same thinning prescription as was used last fall east of the Visitor Center will be used. An information sheet is available at the Visitor Center on Resource Conservation Thinning Project work.

Camping at Farragut has continued to increase over the past two years in spite of higher gas prices and economic issues. In 2008 when gas prices spiked above \$4/gallon Farragut along with other Idaho State Parks saw an increase in camping by those more "local" to the parks. As people took shorter trips to offset the price of gas, they rediscovered the areas in their "own back yards." This year with tough economic times, camping has been seen by many as the best value for the vacation dollar.

Improvement projects upcoming this year will include;

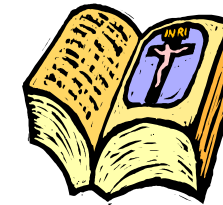
-A new vault toilet at the Eagle boat launch

## FISHERIES REPORT

The IDF&G kokanee task force reported the placement of sonic tags on small fish (under 14 inches). The tags were evenly distributed from north to south. 32 fish in all were tagged. Unfortunately 10 of these fish did not survive. 47 mature lake trout (25 inches) were tagged, bringing the total tagged fish to 79 that have survived.

The department conducts a telemetry survey of the whole lake once a month. This research is intended to provide extensive data on the lake trout movements. This is especially valuable in finding the spawning areas. Anglers may have access to these data by calling Jim Fredericks at the IDF&G office (769-1414). Reports of these areas will be made at each Chamber meeting by Hobe Jenkins 683-2951.

Rainbow trout tags worth a total of \$18,000 have been placed in the lake. There are 42 fish worth \$50; 35 worth \$100; 15 worth \$500 and five worth \$1,000. The tagged fish (from all tagging operations) are worth \$25 plus whatever that particular tag was worth.

Kokanee census work will start on August 17 and the data published by late September. Kokanee have been reported up to 16 inches in length.

The Navy is developing a five-year plan. IDF&G is proposing the Navy consider improving the gravel areas in the Navy basin for added spawning habitat and improvements in the quality of water draining off paved parking lots.

IDF&G is concerned that any extension of the Waterford Parking lots (between Lakeside & Main and at the Harborview Marina) will add contaminants (pollution) from paved parking lots. Drainage swales are essential to trap these polluting elements on land before allowing the water to sink into the ground where it then drains into the lake.

Since the Bayview waterfront area has become the largest shore-related spawning area, with potential to enlarge in the Navy basin, it is imperative the parking lot run-off be filtered either by drainage swales or an acceptable filtration alternative.

**The next Task Force meeting is August 13.**

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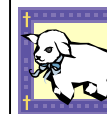

### MARINA PARTIAL PRIVATIZATION UPDATE

Marina privatization is complex, confusing and difficult to evaluate. The IDAPA Rules 20.03.04.015.03 for Commercial Marinas are vague and open to many interpretations.

Several times during July, the DAC met with IDL at their rulemaking sessions to discuss how the rules related to privatization could be improved and made more specific. We left these sessions thinking the input was not really welcome and that IDL was generally satisfied with the rules as written. It seems that IDL is interested in their staff having the "freedom" to negotiate with individual marina owners about how to apply the rules for their specific case. They stated that they did not want to interfere with the marina owner's "business model" by being too specific.

Needless to say, this makes it very difficult for marina owners to prepare applications and even more difficult for the public to evaluate applications. It also places a considerable burden on the IDL staff. The net result is that the implementation of the IDAPA Rules is unique for each privatization application.

Three of the seven marinas at Bayview are now partially privatized. All privatized marinas are controlled by Bob Holland through various LLCs and/or condo associations. The following discussion focuses only on parking issues.

### BOILEAU'S MARINA:

On July 23, 2009, the Idaho Department of Lands (IDL) approved the partial privatization application submitted by Harborview Village Condominium Owners Association (HVCOA). This "Phase One" application privatized 12 float homes and 12 boat slips. The privatization application is based on placing all of the Boileau's Marina and the Kootenai County (KC) permitted 74-space parking lot into a condo association (HVCOA Second Supplement) and selling condo parking spaces that are linked to private float-home moorages or boat slips. The applicant has also applied for a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) from KC to expand the parking lot to 102 spaces for a future "Phase II" application to expand the privatization to 17 float homes and 28 boat slips. A CUP hearing is scheduled for August 20, 2009.

For the November privatization application that was denied, IDL used a literal interpretation of the IDAPA Rules and stated that "No distinction is made between public and private slips for the parking requirement." IDL reaffirmed this statement in the final order stating that only 63 parking spaces are required by the IDAPA Rules (one parking space per two boat slips or two float-home moorages) for the 113 boat slips and 12 float homes in the marina. The KC approved parking lot has 74 parking spaces and the IDL Director, George Bacon, ordered that 51

parking spaces be available for the 101 public boat slips. However, this only leaves 23 parking spaces available to be assigned (sold) to 24 private moorages (12 boat slips and 12 float homes). If the CUP is approved by KC, either as applied for or a lesser number of spaces, then all parking issues will be resolved even for a Phase II privatization expansion.

### HARBORVIEW MARINA:

An application from the HVCOA to privatize 30 float home moorages was issued July 17, and a hearing is set for August 18, 2009. This partial privatization issue is complicated by the fact that 18 of the 20 existing float homes, plus one boat shed, were privatized prior to the adoption of IDAPA Rules related to privatization (April 2, 2008). A total of 52 boat slips and eight seasonal side ties are proposed for the public portion (50%) of the marina in accordance with the IDAPA Rule requiring two public boat slips per private float home. It should be noted that the 52 boat slips were approved by IDL in a prior application, but only half of the slips have been installed, and that the seasonal side ties are new.

The proposed parking includes 50 spaces, all at the Harborview Marina. By following the IDL literal interpretation of the IDAPA parking requirements used at Boileau's Marina (no distinction is made between public and private), the applicant concluded that only 45 spaces are required. However, 25 parking spaces are already platted in the HVCOA First Supplement, of which

21 spaces are sold. If IDL uses the same parking logic as used at Boileau's Marina and requires that 30 parking spaces be designated as "public" to go with the 60 public boat slips, and if the 30 private float homes require 30 private parking spaces, there will be an unresolved parking conflict that must be addressed by IDL and the applicant.

### VISTA BAY MARINA:

On November 7, 2008, IDL "conditionally" approved the application submitted by Watermill, LLC, to privatize 36 premium boat slips, keep 52 lesser slips for the public marina and have 19 "free" public side ties. There are no float homes at Vista Bay. The privatization application is based on placing all of the Vista Bay Marina and the associated uplands (including the "Club" House) into a condo association and selling condo lockers (not parking spaces) that are linked to private boat slips. The IDL Director (George Bacon) ordered that the Pend Oreille Supervisory Area of IDL approve the Applicant's request for the partial privatization once a final private/public breakout and a final parking plan, which meets the standards and requirements of the IDAPA Rules, are submitted to the IDL. The parking plan should allow no more than 18 of the required 44 parking spaces to be dedicated to the private slip users. (Note that under this ruling no parking is required for the proposed 19 side ties.) The DAC is still waiting for IDL to verify that the required "parking conditions" have been met. Meanwhile, the sale of lockers (boat slips) continues. ◇
